
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Editorial Mutterings

August 21, 2017 Total Solar Eclipse Across the United States



On Monday, August 21, 2017, the contiguous United States will experience the first total solar eclipse since February 1979. The Moon's approximately 70-mile wide umbral shadow will travel across the U.S. at an average speed of 2,300 miles per hour (the Moon's approximate orbital speed) passing through 14 states, beginning on the Oregon coast and leaving the U.S. near Charleston, SC at approximately 2:49 p.m. EDT. That's just over 90 minutes after making contact on the Oregon coast!



The Path of Totality in Our Region

Asheville, NC is

just north of the 71 mile wide path of totality. Rather than a total solar eclipse, Asheville will experience a 99% partial solar eclipse. That 99% partial eclipse sounds very impressive, but it is very different than a 100% total eclipse.


You will regret not taking the short ride to get under the shadow of the moon where totality occurs!

The difference between a 99% eclipse and a total eclipse is very dramatic. Only during a total solar eclipse will you experience:

- 1. Noticeable drop in temperatures
- 2. Daytime turning into darkness
- 3. Views of the stars, constellations and planets during daylight hours!
- 4. A view of the Sun's outer atmosphere (the Corona) splashed around the eclipsed Sun
