I was working with the German Air Ministry and lived in Sachsenhausen which is part of Frankfurt. Two stories.

While living there I went to a local restaurant. They only had tables for about 12 patrons. So, I sat at one. When traveling I usually sit alone and read. Soon I was surrounded by Germans who wanted to practice their English. They would tell the jokes in English that made no sense, but all the Germans laughed. I sat across from a young couple. We had a fun conversation. They told me that they were getting married on the next weekend in a castle where they met. They asked me to come to their wedding. I accepted not really knowing what I was to do. They told me to pack for two nights and not to offer any gifts. I was to meet them at a pier on the Main river on Friday. I did and discovered that I was the only Auslander there. It took about three hours by boat to get to the castle. We had a wonderful day seeing the sights and then had a fantastic meal. Then everyone retired to their rooms. The wedding was the next day. It was wonderful even though the wedding was all in German. If it had happened a few years later, I could have understood more because I learned some German.

This was another of my memorable travel experiences.
