Eliminating the ambiguous among people in a work setting was a key factor in that work."



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Mensa Scholarship Winner

Mensa Scholarship Winner JUSTIN SECH submitted the following winning essay.

One morning this past semester, I was finished debating with myself. Half an hour later I was in the registrar's office signing the form to change my major to Computer Science. The next day I was back adding a Robotics minor. A week later, I had picked up a second major in Applied Mathematics and Statistics. I had never felt more certain of anything in my life – I was going to be on the team that puts humans on Mars.

Like many kids, I grew up with a healthy obsession with space and had all of the NASA themed legos and drawings to prove it. I was smart enough to know that telling people I wanted to be an astronaut wouldn't cut it. I grew up assuming I would have to find something more realistic to do with my life. What no one told me was that "rocket scientist", "astrophysicist", and aerospace engineer" weren't make-believe jobs, they were legitimate career options. I entered college as a Chemical and Biomolecular Engineer and told people I was interested in biomedical research. No matter how satisfied I thought I was with my major, I always struggled to explain what it was exactly that I wanted to do, but I figured that was normal. Looking back now, I realize ChemBE represents all of the external cues I desperately latched onto while trying to figure out what I wanted to do with my life. Chemical Engineering felt like a safe balance of biology, chemistry, math, and physics to keep me satisfied. This past semester, however, I realized I was only synthesizing excitement for medicine and research, it was never the topic keeping me awake at night. That was reserved for the one internal passion I was always defaulting back to: dreams of space.

At Johns Hopkins University, I have unbelievable resources at my disposal. Our Applied Physics Lab is contracted by NASA and this past year designed and built the Parker Solar Probe to send on "a mission to touch the sun". The Hopkins Space Telescope Science Institute remotely operates the one and only Hubble Space Telescope. Even my Robotics faculty advisor gets funding from NASA to test extreme environment robots just like the ones we send to Mars.

I came to Hopkins with the intent to take advantage of every opportunity I can get my hands on, and frankly, I can't see a future where I'm not working in the back room of one of those laboratories putting everything I have into learning new skills and making real, professional growth. My current focus is getting through the front doors of the Applied Physics Lab. I've applied for multiple positions and have already built a few connections with people working there. In the meantime, I'm organizing my own self-led projects to sharpen my technical abilities and to open doors to as many future opportunities as possible.

Three semesters into school and my roots are firmly set. I have repeatedly come out of each semester more successful and confident than the last, and I'm as excited as ever to continue pushing my own growth. Rerouting my life trajectory has been beautifully liberating. I finally feel in full control and with a crystal vision of where I'm heading. From here forward it's all engines go.


Local Secretary's Message
