



# Reputation

In 2020 in China, a Social Credit Score system will go into full effect. It has been in development and has been being phased in for many years.

It is run by the Chinese government. It is a system that scores the trustworthiness of each individual and each business. It is based on things like economic responsibility, debt, civil and criminal proceedings, paying court fines, social media, big data, and more. The stated goal of this system is to get people to trust each other and to nudge people into cleaning up low scores by rewarding good scores and punishing low scores. (It is a concept based on Nudge theory.)

The scores are used to determine who will be allowed to travel, who can borrow money, and who will have access to certain goods, services, and privileges. Being blacklisted because of a low score could prevent you from flying, riding a high speed train, borrowing money, buying a house, and other things.

A system like this is predictably coming to America as well.

If someone were to collect the scores from all the places that already score us, it would almost be a finished system.

In addition to the four credit bureaus (Experian, TransUnion, Equifax, and Innovis), many other companies are monitoring and scoring people. In addition, Dun & Bradstreet scores businesses.

The Better Business Bureau scores businesses.

Did you know that Apple monitors iPhone and other device usage to assign you a trust score?

Did you know that there is a service called Sift that calculates Sift scores? It is like a credit score, but it rates trustworthiness.

There is no way for you to find out your Sift score, but there is an excellent Wall Street Journal article that explains the factors in a Sift score.

And Sift has competitors such as SecureAuth.

Facebook is rating the trustworthiness of its users.

LexisNexis calculates and sells PowerScores.

And then there are companies such as Mylife.com that collect and use unverified data (according to Wikipedia, it is a rebranded classmates.com), to create a bogus social reputation rating. They call themselves the "leading reputation platform." Warning: There are many complaints about them on the internet.

A social credit system might be a good thing, but identity theft, fraud, and other factors could turn it into a nightmare for individuals and businesses.

#### Mensa Education and Research Foundation Scholarships

#### ELIGIBILITY for MENSA scholarships:

The <u>only eligibility requirements</u> are that the applicant be enrolled, for the academic year following the award, in a degree program in an accredited American institute of post-secondary education, and be a resident of the area of a participating local group of American Mensa. For the general awards, the applicant need <u>not</u> be a member of Mensa nor qualified for Mensa, and the general awards are unrestricted as to age, race, gender, level of post-secondary education and financial need.

#### **CONDITIONS** of awards:

Awards will be made on the basis of an essay of fewer than 550 words, which describes the applicant's career, vocational, or academic goal toward which the scholarship is to provide aid.

Entries will be judged and awarded at three levels: local, regional and national. Awards are made in amounts ranging from \$600 to \$1000.


- 1. Becky Folger, on behalf of the national office, gave approval to proceed. ☑

- 6. Deadline for ballot return (no fewer than 90 days following the first publication of the proposal) is October 1, 2019.
- 7. To become effective, an amendment requires an affirmative vote of the majority of those casting valid ballots, as well as the above approval of the AMC.
