# LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT WORKSHOP, MOBILE, AL MARCH 6-8. YA'LL COME!!!!!

This is your last chance to sign up for the Region 5 Leadership Development Workshop (LDW) scheduled for March 6-8, 2020 in Mobile AL. The LDW is open to ALL Mensa Members who want to learn more about how Mensa is run, or hold a leadership role in a Local Group, or are considering taking a leadership role in their Local Group. Our host is South Coast Mensa. The cost is only \$25 per family.

Friday night (March 6) will be sessions on Conflict Resolution and Dealing with Problem Members, led by a former Ombudsman. Saturday, March 7 will feature morning sessions on Gatherings; Getting Area Groups Going (works for SIGs and age-defined groups, too); Welcoming New Members; and Getting People Involved, all led by past or current RVCs or their spouses.

Saturday afternoon will be small group breakout sessions for LocSecs, Proctors, GYCs (Gifted Youth Coordinators), etc. Sunday morning we will have presentations by the National Office.
