You still have a few days to register for the Piedmont Area Mensa RG coming up March 27-29, 2020. It's a Pirate themed RG. Registration is $\$ 85$. Until March 20. This month I want to emphasize the Jewel Award Program, and I am doing it this month because Mensa's award year runs April 1 through March 31 the following year. I want Region 5 to hit the ground running!

From the very inception of this program abut five years ago, I have felt that it is a Blueprint on how to grow a strong Local Group. There are four awards, from lowest to highest, Emerald, Sapphire, Ruby, and - for the highest group in each size category - Diamond. Each local group is competing with others groups of the same size. Group I has over 1100 members; Group II, 400 --1099; Group III, 200-399; Group IV, 125-199; and Group V, fewer than 125 members.

The Newsletter Editor alone can contribute 76 points by putting out monthly newsletters with an events calendar, LocSec Column, RVC Column, ExComm minutes, an Officer Listing, and a member submission (a photo, poem, piece of art, article, etc. by a member), and, at least quarterly, a Treasurer's report. Group V (fewer than 125 members) only has to get 80 points for an emerald award, so the Newsletter Editor is really powerful here !!

Proctors, too, can earn lots of points for the Local Group. They earn three points for every proctored test session; 5 points for every unique testing location (we in Charlotte Blue Ridge Mensa use the local Red Cross buildings in Salisbury and Charlotte for free. If you have a member who is in the American Legion, you might get use of the meeting room free. A lawyer member might offer the conference room at his law office for an occasional testing session. You get the idea!) Each proctor who tests twice a year earns two more points. If the group tests on National Testing Day in October, they earn 5 more points.

If a group participates in Mensa Cares, they earn 2 points; in Culture Quest, 1 point per team. And finally - a shameless plug for the LDW being held in Mobile, AL March 6-8, 5 points per member attending PLUS a bonus of five points if three or more members participate! The group hosting a standalone LDW or an RG earns 8 points.

You can read all the rules at https://www.us.mensa.org/recognize/group-awards/local-group-jewels/ Please consider making points in the Jewel Award system a priority this year. Not only do you get a nice frameable certificate and trophy, mention in the Mensa Bulletin, and bragging rights, but your group will surely be stronger and maybe larger by the end of the year!
