#### Regional Vice-Chairman's Message



Election season is upon us once again, and the ballot is crowded this year. There are two candidates for Chair: LaRae Bakerink and Timmy King; two for First Vice Chair: Peter DuDeck and Lori Norris; and four for Second Vice Chair: Antonio (Toni) Belarmino, Angela Christie, David McCallister, and Robert Salkin.

There are two candidates for Treasurer, Taz Criss and James Winschel .There is only

one candidate for Secretary, Ian Randal Strock, so he has been declared the new Secretary .I am still the only candidate for RVC 5, so I hope you have been satisfied with my work as RVC 5 .The voting period runs from April 15 to May 15, and you must be a paid member as of March 31 in order to vote.

As John Voymas, RVC 4, explained it, "Mensa uses a method called preferential voting (also known as ranked-choice voting). When you vote for Second Vice Chair, you will indicate your preference of candidate and rank them from 1 (first choice) to 4 (last choice). You do not have to rank all four - you could just put 1 by your first choice and 2 by your second choice and stop there. If no candidate gets over 50% of the vote, the fourth place candidate's ranked votes will be distributed to the other three candidates based on the ranking of the other three candidates on ballots which chose the fourth candidate as their first choice. This method saves time and money by only having a single ballot which can be used for runoffs when no single candidate gets a majority of the votes."

There is one proposed Bylaws Amendment that will be on the ballot. Currently, elected AMC terms are for two years. The proposed amendment is to change that to terms of three years, as International Mensa has done. There will be more information in the Mensa Bulletin.

#### Twin Towns

*Lizzz Russell*, FBM's SIGHT Coordinator, shares this message from Bill Zigo, the National SIGHT Coordinator.

"You may have already heard a little bit about Twin Towns, as it is already has some publicity. It was started the 2nd half of 2020 by a number of Mensa International SIGHT Coordinators, as an activity to keep SIGHT and Mensans involved when we weren't necessarily traveling as much.

"Twin Towns will pair two Mensa "towns" from different parts of the world for opportunities to socialize online. A "town" can be a Mensa community of any size, whether it be a big city, a medium-sized city, a chapter, or a group of adjacent small chapters. Last November, we had a trial run of the project and selected 4 pairs of cities. Of these, one pair that was selected and started was between New York City and Paris. That pair now meets monthly .Other countries already participating include France, Serbia, Finland, Australia, and Taiwan. More recently, Boston Mensa began a twinning with Mensa Ireland .The trial run was considered successful, and shortly an international panel will be set up to coordinate requests and pairings.

"To answer a couple of preliminary questions: To participate, you probably need a critical mass of at least 12 active Mensans, but more is always better. You would want to meet at least once a month, possibly more often if there is interest. There is no requirement to use any particular program for it - most pairs are currently using Zoom, but we have also discussed use of Discord, Google Meet, jit.si, and perhaps others as we learn of them."

# Methods of Digital Manipulation: Browser Hijacking by Adware

Your browser is the program you use to go to the internet. Some examples of browsers are Mozilla Firefox, Apple Safari, Google Chrome, Microsoft Edge, Chromium, Opera, Brave, and many, many more .(NOTE: MICROSOFT SAYS - DO NOT USE INTERNET EXPLORER ANY MORE)

Advertisers and thieves want to control your internet experience to their advantage. One of the ways they do this by changing your browser settings.

Did you ever open your browsers and it suddenly opens to a new page that you never saw before or a whole bunch of new icons appear on the page or you have a new toolbar or your internet is suddenly much, much slower (due to advertisers spying on you)?

Chances are excellent that your browser has been hijacked.

Hijackers often get in from map, recipe, game, music, and format conversion websites. They will tell you that they will protect your searches or that they will help you find coupons or that you need a new media player. The tricks are endless.

According to ppcprotect.com, "the average person is now estimated to encounter between 6,000 to 10,000 ads every single day. (https://ppcprotect.com/how-many-ads-do-we-see-a-day/)

That's obviously not enough. You need more, and you can get more with a hijacker.

One adware hijacker that I have seen hundreds of times over the years is called Conduit. It is usually installed without your knowledge, and it shows up as a toolbar or a search engine. If you see Conduit as your search engine or conduit.com in your address bar, do a search on how to get rid of it.

Another group of hijackers that I have seen so many times is from Mindspark If you see Mindspark, something you probably do not want has snuck into your computer.

Sometimes the hijackers install programs that you can remove in the way that you would normally remove programs. Sometimes the hijackers install extensions or add-ons. This is an important place to check in your browser. For example, Firefox and Chrome add-ons and extensions are easy to find by left-clicking on the Open Menu icon.



I personally do not use any add-ons in my browsers.

The best thing to do is a search to find out the specific removal procedure.


