Regional Vice-Chairman's Message



I spent some time this week reading newsletters from other regions, and I am astonished at how many local groups are already holding in-person events. My local group, Charlotte Blue Ridge Mensa, has been holding testing sessions for months now, but of course the number of people attending a testing session is usually quite limited, so we were able to stay sociallydistanced, wear masks, etc. We are already discussing holding our annual picnic this

summer, and the CDC has announced an end to many restrictions.

With the new relaxation of "gathering" restrictions, I am eagerly planning to attend the World Gathering in Houston, TX August 24-29, 2021. Register at <u>https://ag.us.mensa.org/</u> I'll also be in Duluth, GA (near Atlanta) for Peachtreat 45:

So many important things happened at the last quarterly AMC meeting. The Board was in a "Yes" mood, because all motions passed (except the one proposing to hold all Regional Meet and Greets simultaneously.) Something of importance to ALL groups is that new Minimum Standard Bylaws and new Model Bylaws were approved. As you know, the Minimum Standard Bylaws, by mandate, apply to all groups whether they are specified in the local Bylaws or not. All ExComms should check the new Minimum Standard Bylaws NOW to see if they are in compliance. The AMC also adopted Event Safety Standards, which is a Code of Conduct for national events such as Mind Games and the Annual Gathering. We also updated the definition of "acts inimical" to include harassment and retaliation. We updated the Hearings process for both regional and national Hearings. We approved a Job Description for the Advocate to help people involved in Hearings. We clarified how RVC funds may be spent, and approved guidelines on how to replace an RVC who has resigned or is incapacitated.

We specified the cost of testing (Home Tests \$9.99, "Private Testing" at Prometrics \$99, and local testing \$60.)

The AMC also reviewed the results of the recent survey of the membership and local group leaders, and there were several important points. Our "Net Promoter Score" has dropped from 23 in 2017 to 7. Ouch! Scores were particularly low among Millennials, Gen-X, parents, and African-American members. Members who stated reasons for leaving Mensa said that dues were too high for what they get, and that local group activities were unappealing. We have some work to do!



In an effort to become a licensed Ham Radio operator, I registered for my FCC Registration Number (FRN), watched the Ham Radio Technician videos on youtube.com, read the book, took the practice tests at AA9PW.com, and have been going to the local ham radio club meetings.

Last month, I took the ham radio technician test. I passed! Now I have a call sign. Upon passing, I watched the celebratory video, https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=p3G5IXn0K7A. :)

To my delight, one of the members of the ham radio club gave me a Baofang UV-5R portable radio with an extra battery and long rubber ducky antenna so I could get my feet wet.

I took the radio home and charged it up.

When I turned the radio on, the display came up with my name on it. So nice! It made me feel welcome and part of the club.

It was then that I realized that I am a total neophyte. Did I have to say my call sign first? Could I monitor traffic without announcing that I was doing so? What if I was on the wrong channel?

Undaunted, I watched a bunch of videos to learn about the UV-5R.

I started monitoring ham radio traffic—Listen before I leap and all that.

Of course, Murphy's law kicked in (I live less than 50 miles from Murphy, so the effect is stronger). There was dead silence on the radio. Once in a while the transmission light would come on, but nobody spoke.

Next, I took the radio for a ride into town. Success! There was an announcement about the next ham radio club meeting. Ta da!

At that ham radio club meeting, the club members told me an antenna would be necessary to use the radio at home because I live in one of those dreaded dead zones.

On June 26, over 35,000 radio amateurs in the U.S. and Canada will be taking part in the annual Amateur Radio Relay League (ARRL) Field Day (<u>https://www.arrl.org/field-day</u>). Our club is getting together for this event to operate from our remote location right here in WNC. It should be an exciting learning experience!

On Shaky Ground by Lizzz Russell

Our nation's infrastructure is on shaky ground because of a lack of computer security and a lack of preparation for probable events such as EMPs/big solar flares.

Computers, smart phones, and the Internet of Things (items such as buildings, televisions and cameras) are so vulnerable that many hackers now pick and choose their targets on the basis of maximum profits, control, and satiation of their desires. The Federal Government, local governments, schools, hospitals, charities, police departments and big companies are the current preferred targets.

Plus North Korea is funding nukes with money they stole from us and others.

Recent targets of hackers include the Colonial Pipeline, much of Belgium's Internet services, the New Zealand Stock Exchange, two water purification systems in Pennsylvania, many school districts (even caused school closures), universities, the Houston Rockets, and many, many, many others.

In addition to ransom, extortion now often follows. According to the New York Times, 26 government agencies were ransomed since the beginning of 2021. In 16 of those cases, the cybercriminals threatened to release data if the ransom was not paid. Some sensitive data was actually leaked, such as sensitive information stolen from the Washington D.C. police department.

In the past few months, new processor side-channel attacks have been found, 19 petabytes of data were found exposed across over 29,000 unprotected data bases, over 380,000 easy-to-hack IP cameras were found, forged covid vaccines cards and fake vaccines are for sale on the dark web, a new fragmentation aggregation attack that can be used on almost every wi-fi device was just found (even WPA3 is compromised), and a new method to attack the TOR network was also found.

The bottom line is simple-- If hackers kill your electricity, poison your water, stop the flow of gas, steal your money, disable your electronic door lock, or monitor your children in your home with your camera, what are you going to do? What is your survival plan?
