Regional Vice Chairman's Message



The AMC met July 10-11 at the new national office in Hurst, TX. We spent Friday in orientation sessions. Saturday we held our regular AMC meeting with the new Chair, Timmy King; new 2nd Vice Chair, Angie Christie; and new RVCs in Regions 1, 2, 3 and 7. One of our first orders of business was the appointment of Robin Crawford as Communication Officer; Kimberly Strickland as Membership Officer; Charlie Steinhice as Director of Science and Education; and the re-appointment

of Tabby Vos as Marketing Officer. We approved the annual audit of the 2020-2021 Consolidated Financial Statement. Tabby Vos and Lowell Aplebaum were appointed co-chairs for the 2023 Annual Gathering, and Action Committees were set up for 2021-2022.

Becky Folger, the Local Group Services Manager, gave each RVC a "Snapshot" of their Local Group activity for the past year. Ten of our twenty Local Groups in Region 5 actually grew last year, in spite of all the COVID restrictions! Special kudos go to Mensa in Georgia, Middle Tennessee Mensa, Charlotte Blue Ridge Mensa, and Mensa of Eastern North Carolina, all of whom gained twenty members or more between June of 2020 and June of 2021! Three groups held a total of 15 test sessions during the past year. (After all, test sessions are very easy to social-distance – just put one candidate at each table, and wear masks.) Ten groups were able to continue monthly newsletters, and almost all continued quarterly newsletters.

All of this was extremely good news. I notice from your newsletters that most of you are scheduling in-person meetings again, and I can't wait to see you myself!

The most popular HAM radio event in the U.S. and Canada is called the ARRL Field Day.

This annual event simulates emergency situations to test the preparedness of the amateur radio community. Local groups of ham radio operators go out into a field and set up power, antennas, radios, and then they start broadcasting.

This was my first field day. It was a great learning experience.

Solar panels with inverters were set up to run the radios and analyzers.

Vertical antennae (resembled flag poles) were set up. In addition, a nimble young man climbed up into a tree and tied off a horizontal dipole antenna. It is amazing how many different configurations can be used to collect signals out of the air.

Wires were run from antennae to the radios, and then the broadcasting started.

It was GREAT fun!

One of the very experienced ham radio operators in our group was able to contact over 250 other ham radio stations in just a matter of hours. I was also able to broadcast, but only contacted a few people.

In addition to the experience, there was lots of delicious food.

I'm already looking forward to the next Field Day.



Bugs Behaving Badly

Have you ever run over a yellowjacket nest while mowing in your yard? If so, then you know that they can be quite aggressive if you disturb them — swarming and stinging. If you are very allergic, you need prompt medical attention to make sure you don't die.

The most common species in North Carolina is the eastern yellowjacket. It is about the size of a honeybee, but thinner and not as hairy as a honeybee.

Every year, as much as 40% of the eastern yellowjackets are parasiticized by the southern yellowjacket.

Aside from bothering humans, yellowjackets are beneficial. They attack and kill many types of insects that can harm your garden.

Most of the yellowjackets in North Carolina make nests and live underground. They are often found in the middle of a landscape. Their nests look like a hole with what looks like egg carton material around the hole.

They LOVE sugar — berries, fruit juice, nectar, soft drinks — but they will also settle for a bite of your sandwich or some deviled eggs. If you don't want yellowjackets, don't leave ripe fruit hanging around your yard!


You can trap yellowjackets by hanging a fresh piece of meat or fish over a pan of soapy water. This works because they eat until they are so full that they fall down. (They do not like rotting meat.)

Logic Puzzle: The Herbalists

Five herbalists (Antonius, Domingo, Flavian, Horatio, and Lucius) collected different amounts, from least to most, (a bit, some, standard, a lot, and a pile) of five herbs (mandrake root, cinquefoil, rosemary, juniper berries, and mistletoe) during various phases of the moon (new, first quarter, half, third quarter, and waning crescent).

Can you figure out who collected mistletoe, when, and how much? (Solution is near the Executive Committee Report.)

- 1. Mandrake Root was collected in a standard amount of time in the third quarter of the moon.
- 2. Rosemary was collected on a new moon in the maximum possible amount, but not by Domingo (who didn't collect cinquefoil, either).
- 3. Antonius and Horatio were working on either a half moon or the third quarter.
- 4. The juniper berries were collected on the moon's first quarter.
- 5. No one was collecting mistletoe on the two last phases of the moon.
- 6. Horatio harvested the smallest possible amount of herbs on a half moon.
- 7. Three herbalists the one who collected only some herbs, another who collected mandrake root, and Flavian were working on first and third quarters of the moon, and also on the waning crescent.
