And I also have to throw accolades to South Coast Mensa (Alabama) for winning the Diamond Jewel Award again this year. Two years in a row!! Those folks are really doing something right!!

Actually, we earned 12 Jewel Awards during the 2020-2021 pandemic year:

Class I (1100 + members) – **Mensa in Georgia** won a Sapphire award

Class II (400 to 1099 members) **Charlotte Blue Ridge Mensa** won a Ruby Award

Class III (200 to 399 members) **Piedmont Area Mensa** won a Sapphire Award

Ham Radio: HTs (Handheld Transceivers) by Bea Reddy

Most HAM radio operators have at least one handheld walkie talkie style of radio. They are called **HT**s or **H**andheld **T**ransceivers (transceiver = *trans*mitter + re*ceiver*).

Licensed HAM users can dial in any authorized frequency desired.

It might not look like much, but my HT has the following features (they vary):

- Two-Channel Color Display
- Bluetooth, including a Push To Talk (PTT)
 Button
- Built-in GPS
- Automatic or Manual Roaming
- Analog or Digital Transmission
- Store up to 4,000 Channels, 10,000 Talk Groups, 200,000 Digital Contacts
- Programmable Power Levels
- DMR (Digital Mobile Radio, including Time Division Multiplexing)
- Can be programmed from a computer

And MORE!!!!!

An HT is really all you need when getting started in HAM radio. Prices range from around \$25 to over \$1000. If you do a search on a shopping site for **HANDHELD HAM RADIOS**, you can see for yourself.

By themselves, they have a range of between 4 and 6 miles on flat ground (less in the mountains or if there are obstructions), but when you connect to a repeater, you can reach greater distances. Repeaters can extend your range from less than 50 miles to hundreds of miles, depending on terrain.

Methods of Digital Deception: DDos

Have you even been going from one website to another, and one of the websites is VERY SLOW or maybe does not even come up at all?

It could be because the website is experiencing a DDoS (**D**istributed **D**enial of **S**ervice) attack.

Essentially a DDoS attack floods the targeted website or system with so much traffic that it can barely move. It is like traffic in Atlanta during rush hour. In severe cases, it can even make the target become unavailable.

There are various methods that such an attack can be launched. One of them is by sending a command to a group of computers that are being secretly controlled by someone else (called a botnet).

Many people who are not concerned or are lax about their computer's security (the old "I have nothing to hide" mentality) end up having their computer being used in a botnet.

One of the things that has dramatically increased the ability to launch attacks is the Internet of Things (IoT). The IoT includes surveillance cameras, smart TVs, smart anythings, and a myriad of other devices. An incredible amount IoT devices are easily made part of a botnet.

It is so bad that an attack that occurred around the end of Augustbeginning of September was making 21.8 million requests per second. Can you imagine?
