Ham Radio: AUXCOMM by Bea Reddy

Licensed HAM radio operators can opt for voluntary training for AUXCOMM (Auxiliary Communication) certification which allows them to help provide communications support for emergencies, disasters, and some organized events.

In North Carolina, this training includes Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) courses, North Carolina Emergency Management (NCEM) courses (including a 3-day school), classes on how to use certain HAM radio programs such as Winlink, on-site training, and participation in exercises.

There is much to learn when working with a variety of agencies during a situation, and each one is different. It is quite interesting, and I don't know about you, but I'd like to know what's going during a disaster or emergency and to be able to provide support.

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Arthropods Behaving Badly—Scorpions in the Woodpile by Josie



You might want to wear a pair of gloves the next time you go outside to get wood, work in your garden, or clean up piles of debris. A Southern Devil Scorpion might be hiding in damp areas such as under logs, stones, foundations, and wood piles.

Fortunately, they are solitary creatures and prefer to live outdoors. They sometimes also wander indoors and will usually hang out in a moist corner of your home in hopes of a meal. There are even reports of scorpions biting people in bed.

They are not very big—around an inch in length. Their sting is painful, but not lethal. If you are allergic to arthropod venom, you should seek medical attention. The bite site will be red and sore and can last for days.

If you ever see a scorpion in your home, don't walk around barefoot, especially at night.

These creatures eat things like millipedes, insects, spiders, and tiny reptiles. Hopefully they might eat stink bugs, too.

Scorpions grab each other's claws and dance while mating. One female can give birth to up to 80 offspring, one at a time. They hang onto their mother's back for around four weeks.

But wait, there's more . . . At least two additional species of scorpions have been accidentally introduced in western North Carolina, and time will tell if they are here to stay. The first is the Striped Bark Scorpion and the other is the Hentz Striped Scorpion.

MERF Scholarships by Wayne Stanko

French Broad Mensa is again participating in the Mensa Education and Research Foundation scholarship program. Anyone enrolling in an accredited educational institution in the Fall of 2022 may apply for a scholarship. The application is based on a 550 word essay describing the applicant's educational and career goals and how they plan to achieve these goals.

There will be at least one local \$600 award. There could be multiple awards and larger amounts if an essay is forwarded for regional consideration.

Method of Digital Deception: Billions and Billions of Usernames and Passwords for Sale on Dark Web by Lizzz Russell

In the past few years, many billions of usernames and passwords and even some account numbers and personal information such as social security numbers have been offered for sale on the dark web. (Note: the dark web is an invisible part of the internet that requires special programs for access.) Sometimes this information is just outright leaked (called doxing).

How can that be? How are the crooks getting all your passwords and account information?



One of the ways is by using robot web crawlers. These are programs that try breaking into each machine connected to the internet, including yours. If they get in, they look for passwords stored in web browsers. Web browsers are the programs you use to access the internet, including Apple Safari, Microsoft Edge, Mozilla Firefox, Google Chrome, and others.


All of these browsers conveniently store your usernames and passwords for websites you log into so that you don't have to type the credentials each time. To look at your stored usernames and passwords in your browser(s), do a search for

view saved passwords on mybrowser

e.g., view saved passwords on safari

Many sources recommend using a password manager. I do not. Password managers can be hacked and quantum computing is here and will be mainstream soon. Quantum computing will make it rather easy to hack current encryption methods.

I recommend either getting a tabbed alphabetical book or an index card file and writing down your usernames and passwords with a pencil.
