### Why does February have only 28 days? by Sharron Armel

It's a long story. The Roman calendar was changed several times, from 10 months (ignoring what we now call January and February because they had nothing to do with the harvest), to 12 months in 713 BCE. Emperor Numa Pompilius added January and February (with 28 days) to make the total days in the year odd (355). Even numbers were unlucky back then. By the time of Julius Caesar, the 355 day lunar calendar had fallen out of sync with the seasons, so he switched the empire to a sunbased calendar. The traditional 28-day February was retained, but all the other months were given 30 or 31 days. Still not perfect—an extra day had to be added every 4 years.

But the corrections went on. *Mental Floss* tells us that the Roman calendar months were so far out of sync with the seasons that the year 46 BCE had 445 days! And the Gregorian calendar in 1582 said we don't need a leap year at the end of each century. Just sometimes. So February has 29 days every "leap century," that is, if the year is evenly divisible by 400. All other century-ending years have a 28-day February. (Did you first learn about that in 2000? I did!)

Even now, the calendar we use isn't perfectly accurate, and may never be. Earth's axis wobbles; Jupiter's power crimps our style. Our generally-accepted year length now is 365 days, 6 hours, 9 minutes and 9 seconds, or about 365.26 days. Don't forget the "about."

So why DOES February have only 28 days? Augustus Caesar is rumored to have stolen days from February to add to August, his namesake.

### **Executive Committee Report**

But we persevered, and met Wednesday, January 5 at The Madness in North Asheville. Officers and advisors present were Sharron Armel, Michael Havelin, Grace Lehto, Will McGuffin, and Wayne Stanko. Mark Crossley visited briefly.

The group approved the 2022 Annual Calendar of events, as emailed by Sharron on January 1, with locations to be determined as the year progresses.

The group reviewed the 2022 budget draft to be published in the February newsletter. The consensus was that we can afford to host a few more special events this year than budgeted. As the year progresses, the ExCom will organize these gatherings. Possibilities include an autumn train ride in Bryson City, and a spring or summer boat ride on Lake Lure.

"Mensa Cares," an American Mensa project, will coincide with National Volunteer Week (April 18-24, 2022). French Broad Mensa will perform a community service, such as our traditional cleanup of the river park along Amboy Road.

The Ex.Com accepted, with regret, Mark Crossley's resignation as one of our Testing Coordinators. We thank him for his efforts over the past few years. Because we've had no requests for in-person testing for several years, our Proctors-in-Training have not been able to be certified. Existing Proctors are considered active, as American Mensa has relaxed their recertification requirements during the pandemic. Until further notice, all requests for testing will be forwarded to Wayne Stanko (in his Testing Coordinator role), who will help the applicants access private online testing through Prometric, the local testing company authorized by American Mensa.

We discussed the changing conditions in our community regarding COVID. We will continue to plan in-person events, and the ExCom will consult via phone and email to adapt the schedule as required for the safety of our members. Locations for February events were established:

- A. American Mensa Subsidy: We receive a payment every month from the national office, based on our membership numbers.
- B. Special Events: Members who participate in special events may be asked to pay a portion of the cost.
- C. Broadcast: Postage, bulk mail permit, labels, etc. Total will increase in 2022 because we'll have a full year of printed newsletters, and postal rates may increase.
- D. Food: Meals for guest speakers, new members' discount, and group events.
- E. Member Recognition: Service awards for webmaster, editor, printer, party host, etc.
- F. Testing: Travel and food expense for proctors, testing supplies, etc.
- G. Special Events: Summer Picnic and Winter Holiday Party are planned; other event(s) may be added. *If the opportunity arises to send any ExCom members to a regional or other gathering, some of the cost can be covered by FBM; that will require a budget amendment.*
- H. Miscellaneous: Check printing, supplies, etc.
