
Model Trains Station by Fred Tucker



You get it, bozo? So pass me that server of mashed and let's get down, yo! You asked for it this time.



Everything Everywhere All at Once

I am stunned and perplexed. It is the morning after the Oscars were awarded and *Everything Everywhere All at Once* (*EEAO*) swept multiple categories, including the Best Picture award. My angst is because I am a long-time movie buff and I found the winning film to be lacking in coherence, so following the story was more of a struggle than a pleasure. When I watched *EEAO*, my companion was someone who makes a point of seeing most of the critically acclaimed films, and his reaction to the movie was about the same as mine. We are two reasonably smart regular film-goers who simply didn't "get it."

I saw *The Banshees of Inisherin* with this same friend and we both enjoyed that alsonominated film immensely. And I saw *Elvis* twice and would like to see it again. Perhaps it would have helped to know, at the get-go, that the genre of *Everything Everywhere All* at *Once* was supposed to be sci-fi.

I have long been a serious film buff. My background includes a for-credit university course in film criticism, a charter membership in the film group that became FLIFF (Fort Lauderdale International Film Festival), and a long-time membership in a film discussion group known as the "Classic and Foreign Film Society." And I have written a few published movie reviews.

I am wondering if *EEAO* might be the equivalent of *The Emperor Has No Clothes* story? Do people really love the movie...or are folks just going along with the idea that they are supposed to love it? The film is a creative exercise in cinema, and it *is* different. But something "different"

doesn't necessarily mean that the something is good, much less great. However, I do recognize that *EEAO* was on the screen for a lengthy run at Asheville's Fine Arts Theater and now it has more or less swept the 2022/23 Academy Awards. So what am I missing here?

I have long respected A.O. Scott's movie reviews (*New York Times*). Scott calls *Everything Everywhere All at Once* "*messy*," but writes a mostly favorable review. However, Scott does mention that the filmmakers "— *are happy to defy the laws of probability, plausibility and coherence.*"

Of course, most of us recognize that Hollywood politics and/or popularity can come into play when it comes to the voting process for the Academy Awards. and that it can be due to these factors that the film that garners the most critical acclaim does not always win the Oscar. For example, when *Titanic* won the Oscar for Best Picture in 1997, the critics liked *L.A. Confidential*, and there have been many other such examples over the years. Was there something popular or political in play in the Best Film voting process this year?

Many years ago, I heard a film critic give a talk about how movies can be either "Art" or "Pop." So, lastly, is the movie that won the Best Picture Oscar last night "Art" that will stand the test of time, or is it just "Pop" that will soon be forgotten? I would love to have some input regarding *EEAO*'s Best Picture Oscar from other Mensa members. Perhaps local members could have some discussion about *Everything Everywhere All at Once* at an upcoming First Friday or Thu.D! get-together.
